Course Aim:

Honors English III is designed for highly motivated students who desire an engaging class that will prepare them for higher education. The main objectives of this course are to develop students' critical thinking and writing skills, prepare students to meet the rigor of college entrance exams, and help students explore the ways in which American authors have imagined the central themes of freedom, democracy, and equality through literature.

We will study different genres of literature starting from Puritan and Colonial times and reading up until the contemporary moment. Our literary investigations will require students to approach the texts with a sense of maturity and a commitment to understanding multiple historical contexts.
