The Importance of Testing

- Both the SAT and the ACT are used for college admission
- Take practice test
- Use Khan Academy to practice for the SAT test
- Checkout the website for both test to obtain registration and testing dates

SAT/ ACT Scores

- Most schools require the SAT or ACT.
- Most schools will accept either test
 - Double-check with the schools you wish to apply to
 - This information can typically be found on their Admissions page
- It is the **STUDENT'S** responsibility to send *official* SAT/ACT
- If you qualify for free/reduced lunch, see your school counselor for a fee waiver.

Governor's School

- •The North Carolina Governor's School is a unique, enriching experience for **11**th graders (academics and performing arts) and **10**th graders (performing/visual arts **only**). What is Governor's School?
- •Applicants must be NC residents and must have an EOC or other approved achievement test score of 92% or higher in the area of nomination (Please note that students may be tested or retested to obtain the 92% qualifying score before October 10th).




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


