Lord, Cynthia. Because of the Rabbit. New York: Scholastic Press, 2019.

On the last night of summer, Emma and her Maine game warden father rescue a small domestic rabbit stuck in a fence; the very next day Emma starts fifth grade after years of being home schooled. She is paired with Jack who does not seem to fit in with anyone--except they share a love of animals.
