Key differences between middle school and high school:











- Student-centered
- Emphasis on both cognitive and affective development
- Core academic classes are typically year long
- Course selections are mainly fixed or predetermined
- Few transitions during the day
- Transitions are supervised and coordinated by teachers







- Subject-centered
- Emphasis on cognitive development
- Attendance is more strict and is considered per semester per class
- Classes are typically offered by the semester
- Course options vary depending on your plan's after high school
- More transitions each day
- Students transition from class to class independently

 - Career and Technical Education
 - Advance Placement (AP)
 - International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma
 - Accreditation by The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

- AP/IB courses are taught on an A/B day schedule.
- HPC students may take courses at Weaver Academy and through Apex Learning Virtual School (ALVS), Guilford County Virtual Public School (GCVPS) and North Carolina Virtual Public School (NCVPS).

- HPC offers a 4x4 block schedule
- HPC students can earn a GCS Service-Learning Diploma for 250+ hours and a Service-Learning Exemplary Award for 100+ hours.
- HPC has a dual enrollment agreement with Guilford Technical Community College (GTCC) through the Career and College Promise Program.
- HPC students can earn community college credits through our CTE Apprenticeship program and Certifications through Course Skills Testing
- HPC is a member of the Metro 4-A Athletic Conference

Academic Lingo

Here are some key terms to help you understand the academic process:



- ACT: A standardized test used for college admissions in the United States. The ACT test covers four academic skill areas: English, mathematics, reading, and science reasoning.
- Advanced Placement program (AP): A college board program that allows students to take college-level courses while in high school. Students can then take standardized AP exams; those with qualifying scores can earn credit at certain colleges and universities.
- Canvas: Learning Management Platform that allows schools to build the digital learning environment that meets the unique challenges faced by their institution.
- Credits: Used to determine and document that students have met academic requirements, generally at the high school level. Credits are awarded upon completing and passing a course or required school program.

Academic Lingo

Here are some key terms to help you understand the academic process:



Grade Point Average (GPA): A number that indicates how well or how high you scored in your courses on average. It's meant to score you (usually on a GPA scale between 1.0 and 4.0) during your studies and shows whether your overall grades have been high or low. This number is then used to assess whether you meet the standards and expectations set by the degree programme or university.

Electives: Courses that students can choose to take for credit towards graduation

International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB): program is a certified IB World School with a rigorous two-year course of study for junior and senior students that embodies a disciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to learning. IB provides a challenging, and comprehensive education that enables students to understand and manage the complexity of our world.

PowerSchool: Student information system, used to record and track student records, including grades and attendance. It's an award-winning system that allows educators and administrators to effectively and conveniently manage student records.

Academic Lingo

Here are some key terms to help you understand the academic process:



Rank: A measure of how a student's performance compares to other students in their class.

SAT: A multiple-choice, pencil-and-paper test created and administered by the College Board. The purpose of the SAT is to measure a high school student's readiness for college and provide colleges with one common data point that can be used to compare all applicants.

Service Learning: An educational approach that combines learning objectives with community service in order to provide a pragmatic, progressive learning experience while meeting societal needs.

Transcript: A transcript is a certified record of a student throughout a course of study having full enrolment history at educational school including all courses attempted, grades earned, and awards conferred
