5.	What do you think is the purpose for the references, or allusions, to mythology?
6.	Do you identify with Hurston's love of books and school? Why did she like parts of school and dislike parts of it? Provide evidence.
7.	How would you characterize the author as a child? Give evidence.
8.	Why is Hurston afraid to show her teacher how well she can read?
9.	What do you think is the symbolism or the road and the gatepost? Infer, but provide evidence. Think of how the excerpt starts with the author on the gatepost watching the world go by.
10.	WRITING: "My grandmother worried about my forward ways a great deal" – Why was Hurston's grandmother afraid for her? Give evidence (at least 7 sentences).
