Math: This week, we will take our End of Module 6 assessment on graphing. We will begin Module 7 by working through word problems using different strategies. We will also be creating classroom discussions on problem solving. On Friday, we will begin classifying and comparing quadrilaterals.

The spelling words this week will have the schwa sound spelled as an 'a' and 'e'. <u>The spelling test will be on</u> <u>Friday.</u>

CKLA Listening and Learning: This week, we will start a new domain called Native Americans: Regions and Cultures. We will listen and learn about how Native Americans spread out across North and South America in search of food, which led to different languages and cultures. We will also learn about Native Americans in the Mississippi River area, as well as those in the southwest.
