The Honors Visual Art 9 course is designed as a survey course, or an introduction to Visual Art and 2D Design as a discipline. The course will encompass both beginning and more developed students who have a desire to learn the basics of visual art.

Since Visual Art is a form of communication, it is imperative that students learn the "language" of Visual Art. Design elements and Principles are the foundation of this.

We will focus on learning *design elements*, *design and analytical drawing*, *composition*, and *color theory.* Our exploration of media will include graphite, gouache, pen and ink, and collage. Furthermore, students will study theories and vocabulary pertinent to the Visual Arts

Students will be **expected to meet their deadlines**, **stay productive**, **and maintain a sketchbook** for investigation of ideas and to practice drawing skills. <u>I cannot stress enough that</u> <u>this course SHOULD BE TAKEN SERIOUSLY</u>. This is the foundation for the more challenging <u>curriculum in the advanced art classes</u>.

Attached to this letter is a syllabus that will explain these things in detail as well as a supply list, breakdown of grading, and expectations in the class. I look forward to working with all of you during this semester.

Grading

Emphasis will be placed on **art as a** *discipline*; therefore, *we will do research, learn history, study materials, focus on technique, look at, criticize, and write about art*. Even if your skill is exceptional, you must keep up with your assignments and sketchbooks to earn your grade.

Grading is valued as follows:

Major Projects	40%
Quizzes	20%
Sketchbook/Writing/Exercises	20%
Exam (Mid-Term and Final)	20%

Please note that while the production of projects carries the most individual weight for your grade, <u>SIXTY PERCENT of your grade comes from other assignments and work</u>. I cannot stress enough how important it is to keep up with sketchbook assignments, written assignments, and classroom notes (which will be utilized for quizzes, mid-terms, and final exams).

CANVAS

Students will access assignments, rubrics, quizzes, and other documents through Canvas. It is IMPERATIVE that students check Canvas for Weekly Agendas and assignments. Students will also check Canvas for feedback for EACH ASSIGNMENT. ALL STUDENTS SHOULD BRING THEIR CHROMEBOOK TO CLASS DAILY.

Please be mindful of the requirements of turning in assignments on Canvas. If an image is requested in a specific file format, it is the expectation that it will be uploaded that way. If it is not, this could adversely affect your grade. This will be made clear within the assignments on Canvas. <u>Attendance</u>

Students are expected to arrive to classes on time. It is disrespectful to your classmates as well as Mr. Cozart to arrive late. This expectation applies to both in-person as well as online instruction.

If a student has any major issues (is not able to attend a Virtual Class Live, runs into a major problem with a project, etc.), that student should notify Mr. Cozart ASAP through email, Canvas Message, or text **(336-270-9041).**

Sketchbook:

Each student is *required* to have their *sketchbook and supplies for class everyday*. Sketchbooks are to be used as '*Idea books'* in which to plan for images (thumbnail sketches) and used as a *reference* for final projects. Sketches should also be *made from observation* to sharpen drawing skills, and some assignments will even allow for *exploration of media*.

<u>SKETCHBOOK ASSIGNMENTS COUNTS AS TWENTY PERCENT OF YOUR FINAL GRADE.</u> Sketchbook can either elevate or lower your grade, which depends on your consistency in completing assignments. **Sketchbook** will be **due every Wednesday**, unless otherwise noted by the instructor. Some sketchbook assignments will be completed in class, others outside of class.

Deadlines:

Students should check the Weekly Agenda on Canvas for links to assignments and DUE DATE. The expectation is that students will **READ THE ASSIGNMENTS POSTED ON CANVAS AND FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS.**

Assignments are due by the end of the period on that given date. **<u>STUDENTS MUST NOTIFY THE</u> <u>INSTRUCTOR OF ANY ISSUES PRIOR TO THE DUE DATE.</u> In the event of unforeseen circumstances or problems, an extension of 2 days will be given. (For example, if a project is due on Wednesday, the student may take a grade of INCOMPLETE that will remain until 8:00 Friday morning.) If an assignment is not turned in by then, the student will receive a grade of 0.**

Sketchbook assignments will be *due on a date TBD*. Some sketchbook assignments will be completed in class, others outside of class.

Projects:

This is a survey course, intended to introduce the student to art as a *discipline*, with emphasis on *the elements and principles of design*. We will work primarily with *line, perspective, shading (value), color (painting), formal design*, and experiment with a variety of media.

Grades for projects break down as follows:

Project Parameters:	60%
Craftsmanship:	40%

A *rubric* (list of requirements to complete the project) will be given at the beginning of each assignment so the student is aware of everything that will be required within the project. While it is mandatory that the student follows the rubric, *innovation within these parameters is greatly encouraged.*

Craftsmanship (neatness) *accounts for a substantial portion of your project grade. Sloppy, messy, or poorly handled work will adversely affect your grade*. The instructor will provide instruction and tips on how to maintain a clean, professional-looking project.

In addition to projects, <u>written work and reading will be assigned as well</u>. <u>ALL written</u> <u>assignments and readings MUST be completed</u>. Students will be given plenty of opportunity to complete these assignments, both in class as well as home.

Written Assignments and Quizzes:

It has become my experience that students are surprised that <u>I REQURE NOTETAKING, WRITTEN</u> ASSIGNMENTS FROM A VARIETY OF TEXT, GIVE QUIZZES, A MID TERM, AND A FINAL

EXAMINATION. Just as there are theories for science, or eras for history, there is vocabulary, technique, and history that are vital knowledge for the practicing artist. **Despite popular beliefs, art** *is very much an intellectual pursuit*. While I am a firm believer in producing work to learn these things, I also believe that a well rounded artist can recognize and discuss theories, techniques, and media.

<u>Quizzes will be based on notes taken during class and written assignments</u>. Written assignments will be checked periodically and reviewed, as this information will be included on the mid-term examination as well as the final examination.

Mid Term and Final Exams:

All students will take the mid term and final examination for this course.

There will be in class review for both exams. All information will be based upon notes and written assignments completed during the course. In addition, there will also be a performance section of the exam where the student is asked to create or complete images based on the principles and techniques learned in the course.
