





Promotion Requirements

- Grade 10
 - Minimum of 5 credits
- Grade 11
 - Minimum of 10 credits
- Grade 12
 - Minimum of 16 credits
- Graduation
 - Minimum of 22 credits (4 Math, 4 English, 4 Social Studies, 3 Science, 1 Health and PE, Arts elective from 6-12th)



GPA

- Grade Point Averages begin in high school even though high school credits (Math 1, Math 2, Spanish) may have been earned in middle school.
- Every grade is important!



Are AP and Honors classes the same?

AP classes are different--

AP classes have **college-level expectations** for students based on nationally-recognized curriculum standards;

The **quantity and quality** of work expected in an AP course requires a greater student commitment of time, energy, and effort inside of and outside of the classroom;

AP courses, resources, teachers and curriculum are reviewed and approved by the College Board annually;

Students may **earn college credit** depending on AP exam performance.



AP Courses for 9th Graders

AP GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS:

- This class can be used to replace the Civics Literacy class that is required for graduation. You only need to take either AP Government and Politics or Civics Literacy to fulfill the graduation requirement.



AP PSYCHOLOGY:

- This is an elective course. Most students take this class as a 10th-12th grader, but we do have some students take it as a 9th grader.





- Students can begin logging service hours their 1st day of high school
- Students will have opportunity to create an x2vol account at freshman orientation or Freshman meetings in October.

Service Learning

- Not required for graduation, but highly encouraged.

Award

- Requires 100 hours of service over the 4 years of high school
- Student receives a certificate at graduation

Diploma

- Requires 200 hours of service over the 4 high school years
- Wear a service-learning cord at graduation and receive a special diploma.
- Special designation in the graduation program

Athletics

- There are currently 18 sports programs with 37 teams.
- Southeast High fields the following teams for boys: football, soccer, basketball, baseball, golf, cross country, track & field, lacrosse, swimming, wrestling, and tennis.
- Teams for girls are as follows: soccer, basketball, tennis, lacrosse, swimming, track & field, cross country, volleyball, softball, golf, wrestling, and cheerleading.
- **Students must meet academic (>2.0) and attendance requirements for eligibility, have a current physical on file, and pay a one-time athletic fee for the school year.**

ELIGIBILITY CENTER REGISTRATION ESSENTIALS

Below are some items you should have with you when creating an account at eligibilitycenter.org:

Valid Email

To register, you need a valid email address that you check regularly and will have access to **after** high school. The Eligibility Center uses email to update you about your account throughout the process. **Note:** If you have a sibling who previously registered, you will need to use a different email address than the one in your sibling's account.

Basic Student Personal Information

This includes information such as your name, gender, date of birth, primary and secondary contact information, address and mobile number.

Basic Student Education History

When registering, you will be required to provide details about all secondary and high schools and additional programs you attended in the U.S. and internationally. All schools, regardless of whether you received grades or credits must be included. If you attended ninth grade at a junior high school located in the same school system in which you later attended high school, the ninth-grade school should not be listed.

Student Sports Participation History

Select each sport you plan to participate in at an NCAA school. For **certification accounts**, you will be required to provide details on any expenses or awards you received, any teams you have

practiced or played with or certain events in which you participated. You will also list any individuals who have advised you or marketed your skills in a particular sport. This information helps the Eligibility Center certify your amateur status once you **request your final amateurism certification**.

Payment (Certification Accounts Only)

Registration for a certification account is complete only after your registration fee is paid (or upon requesting a **fee waiver**, if eligible). You may pay online by debit, credit card or echeck. For an Academic and Amateurism Certification account, the fee for college-bound student-athletes attending a high school in the U.S., **U.S. territories** or Canada is \$100; the fee for international students is \$160. For students for which an Amateurism-Only Certification account is the right choice, the fee for all students is \$70. Profile Page accounts do not have a fee.

*All fees are nonrefundable 30 days after the certification account fee is paid. If you completed a duplicate registration and paid your registration fee twice, you may be eligible for a refund. To receive a refund, you will need to complete and submit an **NCAA refund form**.*

RECRUITING BEST PRACTICES

Encourage your student to:

- » Talk with their support system about what level of competition they think the student should aim for.
- » Register for an Eligibility Center account before ninth grade.
- » Check their email often for Eligibility Center [tasks](#).
- » Work as hard in the classroom as they do in their sport! Earn the best NCAA [core-course GPA](#) possible.
- » Use this [interactive map](#) to research the admission requirements of NCAA schools they're interested in attending.
- » Research when their [division- and sport-specific recruiting activity periods](#) are throughout each year.
- » If possible, play on elite travel teams and attend camps or showcases in their area.


ATHLETICS AID

All students will receive an individual **OneCard** which will be displayed on a lanyard or clip and are **required** to wear the **OneCard** card while they are on campus.




If a **OneCard** is missing, lost and/or stolen, there will be a **\$5.00 replacement fee**.



As an added safety measure students will walk through Body Scanners each morning.


Handbooks


Attendance Matters!

- Good attendance is the first step to improving your grades!
- Valid reasons to miss school:
 - Fever
 - Vomiting
 - A diagnosed mental or physical illness
 - Family emergencies
- Reasons that DON'T require missing school:
 - Too tired- create better bedtime routines, make sure you're getting enough sleep
 - Someone is bothering or bullying you- instead of missing school, speak to your teacher, counselor, social worker, etc. in the building that can help! Don't try to ignore it and hope it goes away.
 - Mild aches or pains- can be common in the morning and are often easily fixed. You may need to eat breakfast or give your body time to wake up.
 - Vacations- take family vacations during summer break, it's not worth it to miss so many days in a row!



Tardy Policy

- A student is considered tardy to class if he/she is not in his/her assigned location when the tardy bell rings. If a student is late to school, they must first come to the attendance office to get a pass to class
 - 1st tardy – teacher warning
 - 2nd tardy – teacher-given consequence and parent contact
 - 3rd tardy – Referral to administration and parent contact
- The tardy count restarts each quarter. Students with excessive tardies may be placed on an administrative contract to improve his/her behavior.
- ***A little late is too late! Every instructional minute counts and student tardiness interferes with the learning process. Please be respectful of your teacher and fellow classmates and be on time for class.***
