FRESHMAN YEAR CHECKLIST

Organization and Time Management

- Find an organizational method that works for you. Examples include color-coded notebooks, binders for hole-punched pages separated by subject, and planners for recording assignments and due dates or use the calendar and reminders on your mobile telephone.
- Designate a folder for pertinent documents, report cards, certificates, and other recognitions.
- Create and maintain a personal resume.
- Establish a nightly routine and allot a specific and appropriate amount of time for homework, study, rehearsals, extracurricular activities, and sleeping. Good sleep improves brain performance, mood, and health.

College Search

- Start reviewing college opportunities using the Big Future program through College Board. www.collegeboard.org/bigfuture
- The general recommendation is to have your list of college/universities narrowed to 3 to 5 possibilities by your senior year; however, start with at least 10 schools for now. (You could earn \$500 by selecting 10 schools in Big Future.)
- If you are uncertain of majors, look at liberal arts school. Declaring a major typically occurs at the end of college sophomore year.
- Need ideas about possible majors? Visit www.cfnc.org and take a career interest inventory.
- Expand your college list include a far-reaching dream school, a school for which you surpass the requirements, and a mixture between the two. Think about the location, major, opportunities, job placement, travel expenses, etc.

Recommendations

- Although you do not need recommendations now, you will later.
- Make certain you are building bridges with teachers/counselor/coach/mentor/group leader.
- You need at least two faculty members and one additional person available to provide recommendations in the Fall of the senior year.
